



Chief Executive's Report - Joe Powell







This third year of our Business Plan 'Reducing Dependency, Promoting Rights.' focused on helping local groups to look to become sustainable and to look for opportunities to show the important role they can play as preventative services under the Social Services and Well Being Wales Act.

It has also been a year of challenge and uncertainty. We have been aware for some time that groups have faced difficult times since the Advocacy Grant Scheme ended in 2014. During the last three years All Wales People First have been looking at the situation with members to see what needs to happen to safeguard self-advocacy for the future.

In addition to this, the introduction of the Independent Professional Advocacy Contracts, which place a statutory duty to fund 1-1 advocacy has added another challenge to our work going forward. Getting people to understand the difference between advocacy and self-advocacy has been very difficult. We have worked with members of the National Council to speak to their Regional Partnership Boards to explain why self-advocacy is important. We



have also produced a fact sheet 'Why self-advocacy'. Everyone we spoke to was impressed, but that does not mean they will fund self-advocacy in the future.


The National Conference 'Altogether Now' looked at ways we could work with other people with disabilities to have a stronger voice to make political change. This conference built on our conferences in 2016 and 2017 to help us to work out what we need to do for the future.



The anonymous member and stakeholder evaluation (2017) and the independent evaluation work carried out by Ann Lukens with the National Council and the Board of Directors have helped us to work out what needs to change for the future.

The information has helped us to form a new Business Plan (MIRROR Strategy 'Re-Animating, self-advocacy'. This will look to prove self-advocacy works by making it central to the new political times in Wales. A Wales which is looking to be preventive and involve people with learning disabilities in the design and the services they need to achieve their own well-being outcomes. Self-advocacy is perfect for the new Wales. But many people still don't understand this. We hope our MIRROR Strategy will prove this through actions not just words.

All Wales People First Funding



This is the third year of our three-year Business Plan 'Reducing Dependency, Promoting Rights' funded by the Welsh Governments 'Sustainable Social Services and Well Being Grant.

The core aim of the Business Plan was to help self-advocacy groups across Wales to frame themselves around the Social Services and Well Being Wales Act 2014, as preventative services, as well as to re-evaluate good practice within self-advocacy.


The Welsh government funded us £186,325 for this financial year.

This was the third year of our involvement in a Big Lottery/Welsh government 'Getting Ahead 2' bid of approximately £10,000,000 to provide employment and training opportunities for people with learning disabilities and autism between the ages of 16-25.









The project started on 1st June 2016 and we were paid £104,431 for activities up to 31 May 2019 (Year 3).



The DRILL (Disability Research into Inclusive Living and Learning) grant, to produce an evaluation tool which measures the effectiveness of self-advocacy projects was completed this year.


The project commenced on 30th January 2017 and was extended until the 30th September 2018. We received £6,368 for the period April 2018 – September 2018.

The National Council gives us our vision and through it we get the views of self-advocacy groups across Wales.

The national council has a target to get attendance of 70% during this year. They did better than this, achieving 83%. 6 meetings were held this year.

The National Council continued to have a strong influence during this year. Its members continue to be the project managers for the 'Reducing Dependency, Promoting Rights' pack of projects.

They have also taken part in important consultation events which have helped review and inform good practice around including people with learning disabilities.

The National Council in conjunction with Board of Directors decided upon some new core values for the organisation.

The National Council Development Officer Tracey Drew has continued to work with members on developing and evaluating the All Wales People First National Council to make sure it still meets their needs.

The 2018 conference was our first in North Wales, and was the final in a trilogy of conferences looking at the history, health and future of self advocacy for learning disabled adults in Wales.

The 'All Together Now' Conference looked at how we work with other disabled people to have a stronger voice on issues we have in common.

Member's views in the workshops informed the way All Wales People First moves forward over the next three years.

Members talked about the words we use and their effect on the wider disability movement; How self-advocacy fits with advocacy for other people; How we join together with other disabled people to ensure our rights are reflected in government policies; How people with learning disabilities can be included in reviewing legislation.



We produced a conference report which is in the resources section of our website.



Workshop: Speaking Up for Disability Rights in Wales

The aim of this workshop was for members to learn about the Human Rights of People with a Learning Disability.

Workshop: Golden Thread of Advocacy

This workshop was about what the Social Services and Well-being Act says about advocacy and how self-advocacy fits with other forms of advocacy.

Workshop: Measuring the Mountain

This workshop asked people to tell their stories and give feedback about the accessibility of the project measuring tools.




Members talked about the words we use to describe learning disability, and whether words which fit with the Social Model of Disability are important.

Our All Wales Development Worker continued to work with local groups across Wales, to help them to become stronger for the future. The role came to an end on 31st March 2019.

Learning Disability Advisory Group



The National Director Joe Powell, continues to represent All Wales People First on the Learning Disability Ministerial Advisory Group (LDMAG). This group was formally known as the Learning Disability Advisory Group (LDAG). All Wales People First also supports Sophie Hinksman to Co-Chair the group.

All Wales pople First receives funding to provide support for Conwy Connect to support Michelle Williams as the North Wales representative, and for RCT People First to support Lynne Evans as the South Wales Representative.

Throughout 2018 All Wales People First has continued to helpthe Welsh Government to develop the Improving Lives Strategy, which was launched in 2018.



Each LDMAG meeting gong forward will focus on an Improving Lives theme, and AWPF will work with the National Council prior to each meeting so we can feed in their views.

All Wales People First Development Worker



The AWPF Development Worker, Matthew Brindley, worked with local groups across Wales. His post came to an end on the 31st March 2019.

Matthew's work included helping some groups to restructure, reconstitute and secure core funding for self-advocacy.

Matthew also produced a report 'A future for self-advocacy' which outlined the work he has done.

Evaluation



The 2017 Evaluation report was shared with members, support staff and the third sector on 21st June 2018.

The issues for improvement that have been identified will be the measurable outcomes in the forthcoming MIRROR Strategy (replacing our Business Plan) 2019 -2023.

MIRROR strategy



The first drafts of the MIRROR Strategy (Business Plan) were written during this reporting period.

The MIRROR Strategy was informed from independent engagement with the National Council and the Board of Directors by independent facilitator, Ann Lukens, as well as the 2017 evaluation report, by former board member Anne Collis

DRILL



Barod, Bryan Collis (Independent Researcher), Jan Bardsley (Open University) and Jan Walmsley (Independent Researcher) continued to work with us on a Disability Research into Inclusive Living and Learning (DRILL) project to produce a self-advocacy tool kit.

The final reference group was held on the 24th July 2018, which informed the final draft of the toolkit. The toolkit was launched on the 17th October 2018 at our AdFest event.

Engage to Change



In 2016, All Wales People First were part of a successful ten million pound bid to provide employment opportunities for 16-25 year olds with a learning disability or autism.

The project is funded by the Welsh Government's 'Getting Ahead 2' scheme, and is administered on the Welsh Government's behalf by The Big Lottery. The Engage to Change project partners are - Learning Disability Wales, Elite Supported Employment Agency, Agored Cyf, Cardiff University, Project Search.

All Wales People First's role is to evaluate the project. Our evaluation panel have met 3 times this year to look at the work being done through the project and to give feedback.



Gerraint Jones-Griffiths has continued in his role as the Lead Project Ambassador this year, and we welcomed Project Ambassadors Elsa Jones, Jordan Quaite, Jonathan Tranter, and Michael.

The Rights Champion



This is the third year in to our Welsh Government grant, and the full-time Chief Executive continues to be a huge success.

Joe's Assistant continues to work 25 hours a week to help with his workload in Policy and Public Affairs, Marketing and Communications, and Administration.

Employing a Chief Executive with a Learning Disability has raised our profile as a member-led organisation.



Joe's work over the past year has included: Officially opening the University of South Wales 'Disability and Dyslexia and Wellbeing Service; Participating on the Human Rights Stakeholder Group; Participating on the Cross Party Group on Human Rights; Participating on the Cross Party Group on Disability; Participating on the DRILL National Advisory Group; Participating on the Learning Disability Ministerial Advisory Group (LDMAG); Board membership of Elite Supported Employment Agency; Participating on WCVA's Safeguarding Group.



Evaluation

The Chief Executive made pledges in response to the 2017 anonymous evaluation The pledges are intended yo address feedback from local groups and the third sector to improve how effectively AWPF works with local groups and the third sector.

Better physical outcomes for people with learning disabilities

Joe attended meetings of the National Steering Group for better physical outcomes for people with learning disabilities.

Regional Partnership Boards and subgroups

Joe Co-Presented a 'Why self-advocacy?' presentation to Gwent Regional Partnership Board, Powys Regional Partnership Board, Cardiff and Vale Regional Partnership Board, and the Western Bay sub-group, with AWPF National Council representatives.

Transport

Joe and Michelle Williams, the Conwy AWPF National Council representative met with Janet Finch Saunders AM to talk about transport issues in the Llandudno region.





Education

Joe Opened the 'Disability and Dyslexia and Wellbeing Service' at the University of South Wales, Tredegar campus.

Joe attended and spoke at the Psychologists for Social Change event at the Pierhead Building in Cardiff Bay.




