Transport Petition



Transport Petition

All Wales People First filed a transport petition with the Welsh Government. The petition said that people with learning disabilities should be included in all changes to public transport.

This includes bus routes.

And changes to bus stops.

We were advised to do this by Janet-Finch Saunders AM.

Who met with me and Conwy Representative, Michelle Williams in Bangor in January.

We met with her to explain concerns members of North Wales had about transport in their area.

Transport was cut without them being warned.

This meant they were not able to get around.

One member could not get to work because of it.

This goes against the principles of the Social Services and Well Being Wales Act.

Denbighshire Rep James Lewis and his group were also very concerned about public transport in the North Wales region.

They are planning to meet with Arriva to try to resolve this problem.

All Wales People First have promised to help in any way we can.

We are worried about transport cuts across the whole of Wales.

But especially in the North, Mid and Rural areas of Wales.

Powys especially has very limited public transport for people with learning disabilities.

Our petition asked that the Concessionary Bus pass scheme be allowed to be used on train services in local areas.

Transport Petition

The minister Ken Skates AM, Minister for Transport gave us a letter in response to our concerns.

We had the chance to respond to the letter which we did.

Both his letter and our response can be found at the Petitions

Committee website

It was then discussed by the petitions committee and broadcast live on Senedd TV.

The petitions committee seemed to be sympathetic to our concerns.

And they decided to refer the matter back to Ken Skates AM. We will be monitoring the situation.

And we will let you know the outcome as soon as we hear anything.

Learning Disability Commissioner Petition

Cardiff People First – Learning Disability Commissioner Petition

Cardiff People First put together an online petition to call for a learning disability commissioner for Wales.

They felt this was very important because of more news of abuse in the care system.

A Learning Disability Commissioner would make help to make sure the voices of people with learning disabilities are heard in Wales and to prevent abuse in care services.

And champion funding for the right services to help people with learning disabilities get the best services and support possible.

Some other disability groups have a commissioner.

But there isn't one for people with learning disabilities.

The members of Cardiff People First handed their petition in person to the Senedd on the 2nd July.

Member Engagement Advisor Tracey Drew attended the hand in. She was very impressed.

And so were the people at the Senedd.

They said it wasn't very often that people handed their petitions in, in person.

The issue was then discussed by the Petitions Committee and broadcast on Senedd TV.

The Minister said he was not convinced that a Commissioner was needed at this time.

This was because of the work of the Learning Disability Ministerial Advisory Group which has people with learning disabilities on the group.

And the work of the Improving Lives Strategy.

Cardiff People Firsts responded saying that the Learning Disability

Ministerial Advisory Group did not address issues that were affecting peoples everyday lives.

And they said that self-advocacy is the most important right for a person with a learning disability.

They also said that local authorities are funding statutory advocacy at the expense of funding self-advocacy.

The Petitions Committee said that this would go back to the Minister of Health and Social Services, Vaughan Gething AM and they would ask him how people with learning disabilities could raise concerns about care and support.

And how people with learning disabilities could engage with self-advocacy.

Both the Ministers letter and the reply from Cardiff People First can be found on the petitions website.

We will let you know as soon as we know the outcome.

We would like to congratulate Cardiff People First on an excellent piece of work.

It is a positive example of self-advocacy trying to affect political change.

"People with learning disabilities are put in these places and not treated with respect. It's disgusting. A commissioner for people with learning disabilities would champion lessons being learnt, tougher penalties and better regulation."




