This image library contains photographs taken throughout the Through Our Eyes project. The project has been led by people with learning disabilities with the aim of increasing positive and diverse representation throughout the media.

The images are **free to use** by individuals and organisations who seek to improve the visibility of people with learning disabilities.

There are restrictions on **how** the images can be used.

When using the images, you **must**:

 - o This information is provided in the metadata under each image which is visible when you click on the thumbnail.
- Follow the spirit of this guidance and use the images in a positive way to support more diverse representation of people with learning disabilities.

Please:

Be aware of the context of any articles or headlines that the images may accompany.

Be aware that the individuals in the images have provided consent for images to be used as set out in this guidance. They have the right to withdraw consent and we will contact you to ask you to stop using such images.

Abide by restrictions on use:

- No commercial use
 - o you cannot use images for monetary gain eg you cannot sell the images or use on merchandise.
 - o You cannot suggest that individuals in the images endorse or promote a product or service ie no use in adverts.
- No alteration of images you cannot manipulate or transform the images.
- No derogatory or unlawful use you must not defame or show individuals or All Wales People First in a negative light.
- No sensitive use you cannot use the images in a way that implies that the individuals or All Wales People First supports a belief or position.

By downloading the images you agree to our terms and conditions. If we find images that have been used in a way that does not respect these terms, we will contact you and ask for this to be addressed. We reserve the right to take legal action if the terms are breached.

How to find and download images

The <u>image library</u> has a number of image collections under different themes, such as employment, sport and travel.

On the right hand side, you will find a search box. You can search for keywords to help find the images you are looking for. The advanced search provides more specific options to filter content by.

When downloading an image, you can either download the full-size image for a high resolution version or a much smaller file sized version of the image. High resolution is good for printing and smaller sized images are much easier to use in presentations and social media.

Before downloading images, you'll be prompted for your email – this is so that we can get in touch should a subject remove their consent. We also love to see how our images are being used.

In our members' words:

Not so long ago, many of us would have been institutionalised for most of our lives. It is now a breach of our human rights to shut us away just because we have learning disabilities.

We fought hard for our human rights.

We are self-advocates. <u>Self-advocacy</u> means speaking up for yourself. It helps a person to have a say in the important decisions which affect their life.

Self-advocacy gives us choice and control. It allows us to be independent.

Self-advocacy allows us to be part of our communities. We are proud to celebrate our valued roles and the contributions we make in our communities. We are volunteers, employees, family members, partners, spouses, parents, team members, community champions, sportspeople, students, educators and so much more.

Positive representation is important. Our exhibition challenges perceptions and stereotypes by highlighting the valued roles and activities of people with learning disabilities in our communities. 'Through Our Eyes' has also created a free image library so our stories and photos can be shared more widely.

The images you see are a snapshot of a moment in our lives. It doesn't show the full story of everything that we have been through to reach this point.

There are still many unnecessary barriers that prevent us from making decisions. Deep inequalities exist in all areas of our lives. This includes access to healthcare, education and employment. These inequalities limit our opportunities, freedoms and even life expectancy. You can learn more about this in the <u>All Wales People</u> First manifesto.

There is huge strength, dignity and solidarity in the learning disability community.

We will never stop fighting for our human rights.

Remember, our human rights are your human rights too.
