



It has been a very difficult time for me recently. I want to share my experience in the hope that speaking up will stop the same thing happening to others.



I had a surprise letter about my Personal Independence Payment (PIP) to say that my benefit had stopped with immediate effect. I haven't had a PIP review recently and it isn't due for 2 years. It was a big shock and is causing me a lot of stress and anxiety.

The letter didn't give any reason for stopping my PIP and I have not been able to find out any more through calling the PIP office. The letter says that I might have to pay back about £49,000! All the PIP office could tell me is that their computer system confirms my PIP has been stopped even though my review wasn't due for another 2 years.




Because I don't know a reason why PIP has been stopped, it has been difficult to challenge the decision. I cannot use the usual process called *Mandatory review* because I don't have any information to






I had a call about my Carer's Allowance benefit a couple of weeks before the PIP letter came. The person insisted on doing a telephone review for Carer's Allowance immediately. I explained that I have a learning disability and needed to arrange support. They agreed to call back in a few hours. I wasn't given any choice about a convenient day or time. It's a big worry if the same is happening to others. A lot of people with learning disabilities don't have access to good support for these sorts of things at short notice.



The questions they asked me for the Carer's Allowance review were very confusing. At first it felt like a friendly chat. I can only assume they did a PIP review at the same time without telling me. It's frightening how dishonest and inaccessible the whole experience has been. I haven't heard any news about my Carer's Allowance yet.



I'm grateful to my Housing Association for supporting me. It all feels very confusing and inaccessible to me as a person with a learning disability and Autism.

National Council update



The National Council are a group of 22 elected members who represent every county in Wales. We meet 4 times a year. We talk about what is important to members. In March, Reps met for 2 days. We played some games to get to know each other better. We talked about a new business for All Wales People First.



The most important thing we talked about though was the Homes not Hospitals campaign. Reps agreed to support the protest outside the Senedd on 17th April. We came up with slogans for banners and agreed who was going.



It's important that All Wales People First speaks out for all people with learning disabilities, especially people locked away. We heard from Simone Aspis from Inclusion London.

Simone told us about the Free Our People
Campaign. Reps voted to join the campaign.



In June we heard about Reps experiences in the polling stations. Reps feel the new rules about using photo ID to vote are another

barrier to them having a say in important decisions.

I urge all TalkBack readers to use their vote on July 4th.



Reps talked about safeguarding and what a new safeguarding policy for All Wales People First should be like. Reps want to be treated like adults and be included in decisions about their safety. Although members can feel vulnerable at times, we don't want our rights to be ignored when decisions are made about our safety.



Reps also told us about issues in their areas.
The main issue continues to be transport.
Applying for a bus pass is difficult to do
without support. Tom from Denbighshire said
support workers are refusing to use their cars
in work because of insurance costs. Taxis are
expensive. Without transport, members find it
hard to go out and do the things they want to
do.



The next National Council meeting is on 3rd September in West Wales.

I do, I put my vote in by post. I used to do it by going down to the elecion place but I found there were too many barriers.


Why do you think it's important?

Is it easy?

By post is easy but at my local polling station, the last time I went there, there were too many barriers for me. Barriers for getting my wheelchair in to the building, the table being too high, and information that isn't easy to understand.



Would you prefer to vote by post or in person?

If the polling station was more accessible I'd prefer to put my vote in there myself. It's not really the same doing it by post. I don't feel confident that my vote has been received at the right place and recorded.

How could voting be made easier for more people with Learning Disabilities?

I think polling stations should be accessible for everyone who wants to vote in person. They need to have good access for wheelchairs and accessible information.



If the buildings can't be made accessible then I think they should move the voting to somewhere else.




I think there should be more information available in Easy Read. I don't understand a lot of the information about how to vote and who to vote for.



If you could pick one thing for the new government to sort, what would it be?

That's a good question! I'd ask them to think more about people with learning disabilities. Think about better services and facilities. Thinking about our local gathering centre, we don't have much room at the moment, it's too crowded and not ideal for long term.




General Election 2024: Chief Executive - Joe Powell

Adam Bartle has done a brilliant job spreading the word about People First Bridgend. He has met with different services to give a presentation about what People First Bridgend does. Adam had lots of positive things to say: "It (the self-advocacy group) helped me to build new skills, to live more independently and to feel more in charge in my own community".



Craig Channell, Chairperson of the Regional Community Workgroup, recently gave a presentation at the 'My Community Event', at the University of South Wales. Craig understands the issues that people with learning disabilities face in the community, like employment and volunteering opportunities, travel and daytime opportunities. He is passionate about being a strong voice for learning disabilities.



We have been doing more work with Swansea University Social Work department. This includes interviewing people who want to



go on the social work course and delivering learning disability awareness and communication training to the students.



We have been working hard with South Wales Police too! We really enjoyed helping them with their Specialist Interview Course at the Police Learning Centre in Bridgend. They wanted our help to get better at interviewing people with learning disabilities. Members watched a short video clip of a crime and were then interviewed by a police officer. The tour around the learning centre was very exciting!



We have had 'Strategy Days where we have looked at opportunities and challenges for People First Bridgend, and they have included the voices of members from the self-advocacy group, BSSG, and staff and trustees.



A nice finish to all our Strategy work was welcoming Joe Powell to our group! He taught us so much about Self-Advocacy and helped us to think about our rights and why we need People First Bridgend.
