

National Council update



National Council met in Swansea on September 9th and in Cardiff on November 4th.

We were really sad to see that Powys
People First have closed down due to the lack
of funding. It's also sad to see other support
services for people with learning disabilities
closing.



Without these services people with learning disabilities will have lots of concerns for their social life and their usual routine of activities.



People with learning disabilities need fuller lives, not the loss of more services.

My condolences to the members and trustees of Powys People First.





 We talked about the LeDeR report in England that gives information about any avoidable deaths of people with learning disabilities. An avoidable death is when

something could have been done to stop the person dying. Reps said it is important that we know this information in Wales too to prevent further deaths. I feed back to LDMAG about what Reps had said at National Council.

- Reps are keen to see better healthcare, especially more GP appointments, letters in easy read and good quality annual health checks.
- Lots of members are having problems when they switch from Employment Support Allowance to Universal Credit. People are also worried because they don't understand if there will be more changes to benefits.
- In November, we were joined by Mencap Cymru. They talked about their Cashless Society campaign to keep shops and other services taking cash as well as cards for paying for things. In separate groups we talked about how to support the campaign in our local

groups. Reps voted to work with Mencap on a project to get more shops taking cash. Watch this space!



In the November meeting the National Council launched the AWPF Manifesto 2026. The manifesto lists the most important issues for people with learning disabilities in Wales.



We hope political parties will listen and promise to help with these issues if they are voted into the Senedd next year.

Big thank you to Mark Isherwood who joined is at the launch. Mark has given us massive support over the years in improving the lives of people with learning disabilities.



As Vice chair of the National Council it's been great to stand in for Lucy to write this article. As we come to the end of the year we hope next year our voices will continue to be heard loud and clear.

A few weeks ago, I was asked by All Wales People First to do a BBC news interview about climate change. I met with BBC journalist Garry Owen on Barry seafront. We talked about my work with the One Planet project.



"Before I started the job (with One Planet) I didn't know anything about climate change. As I got on with the role I educated myself and literally grew and knew more about it. So I think it's about educating yourself but also educating others".



Behind the scenes we talked more about the barriers to getting involved with climate change...



I explained that One Planet has funding to cover a few areas in Wales. The activities I'm involved with are a great way to get people with learning disabilities involved with the environment and reducing their carbon footprint. We do all sorts:

Building confidence with travel so that people can use public transport confidently and walk more. Walking is much better for mental and physical health and the environment.

The repair Café, where you can trade, swap, use and buy stuff to make something.

The eco gardening is fun too. It gets people growing their own food, and being outdoors is great for mental health.



Not everyone with a learning disability has access to activities like these though. I think access to information about climate change and eco-friendly activities can be out of reach for some people.

Cuts to services, especially local People First and self-advocacy groups mean there are less opportunities for people with learning disabilities to grow their knowledge, skills and experience in general. Self-advocacy helps people to have a voice and to have the confidence to make their own decisions about lots of things which affect them, including climate change.



I'm passionate about my paid role at Innovate Trust as One Planet Assistant Project Officer and about educating others on climate change. I think there should be more paid employment opportunities like this for people with learning disabilities.

We launched our manifesto in Cardiff and live on Facebook on 4th November.


Our members want Welsh Government and decision makers to understand what is important to us as people with learning disabilities in Wales. Our priorities in this Manifesto are: Self-advocacy;

Caerphilly People First TRAC Meetings

Members of Caerphilly People First have been taking part in TRAC meetings with the University of South Wales. TRAC is a project that helps train student nurses by including the lived experiences of people with learning disabilities. At the meetings, we discussed developing an Easy Read Risk Assessment, and we're delighted that Ffion and Gethin will be involved as Teaching and Research Leads/Co-Researchers, and will be trained and paid to take part in research and teaching. By taking part in this work, we can support better training and help ensure people with learning disabilities get the right care.

Online Hate Crime Training

A huge thank you to Noah from Victim Support for delivering online hate crime training to our members recently. They really enjoyed the session and gave some great feedback on what they learned:

Andrew – learned how to make accounts private and how to report hate crime.



Theresa – found it helpful, especially learning not to answer phone scams.



Olivia – found it very interesting and learned about safe settings.

Members also learned that hate crime can be reported to Victim Support, as well as through social media platforms if abuse happens online.



GAVO Volunteering Awards 2025

Our member trustee Rob M organised and ran 3 seasonal fayres which were so much fun.




We worked with Penderi Cluster on a huge Well Being event to share information about Health Checks with loads of organisations.

Sophie Hinksman and I co-chaired another Homes not Hospitals sub-group of the Learning Disability Ministerial Advisory Group at the Welsh Government offices in Cathays Park today. Sophie opened the meeting with a one minute silence for Hefin David MS who sadly passed away a couple of days ago. The group also agreed that the final report would be dedicated to Hefin's memory and the enormous role he has played in fighting for the rights of people with learning disabilities and autism who have been sectioned inappropriately in secure settings. Today we fine tuned the report for submission to the main Learning Disability Ministerial Advisory Group in September. They will then decide whether to endorse it and submit it to the Minister.
